Raider Pride Success

Raider pride is something often talked about at Quincy Notre Dame among the students, staff, families and alumni. Raider Pride goes beyond

cheering on athletic teams and rooting for academic success. True Raider Pride is showing compassion for one another, respecting each other, always trying your best and supporting each other when times are tough. The success of the 2020 QND Fund Drive showed that Raider Pride continues to be strong and generous.

The Quincy Notre Dame Foundation announced in October 2020 that the QND Fund Drive raised \$492,653 in gifts and pledges exceeding its goal by \$48,153. The Fund Drive kicked off in January 2020, and was led by co-chairpersons Monica (Briddle) Hinkamper '82 and Bryan Stokes. The commitment of the Raider community to ensure the success of QND was evident in the numbers.

The 2020 Fund Drive, held during the most vulnerable time in our country, saw 177 new donors step up to help our students and staff which accounted for more that \$59,000. Gifts from QND alumni represented 64% of the total number of gifts. Dedication to the school was also shown through the 368 increased gifts to the Fund Drive for more than \$44,000.

The commitment from the Raider community is a true inspiration to all. "Once again, I am humbled by the generosity, sacrifice and passion from all of our donors. They ensure the continued development, growth, and success of QND and its students," states Hinkamper.



The Fund Drive is the most vital fundraiser overseen by the QND Foundation and to date has raised over \$16.5 million. The drive keeps tuition affordable by paying a portion of the school's operating expenses to close the gap between the cost to educate and student tuition. The campaign also provides tuition assistance to students. Currently, 35% of the QND student body receives financial assistance.

"This has been a unique year for all of us and the success of the Fund Drive is a true testament of our mission, dedicated investors and committed Fund Drive leaders and volunteers," said QND Foundation Executive Director Kurt Stuckman. "As we transition into the new year and kick off the 2021 QND Fund Drive, we will continue providing a high-quality education and respectfully seek your continued support."

Different Look, Same Tradition


Due to the COVID-19 global pandemic and Illinois Governor J.B. Pritzker's decision to cancel in-person learning in the state of Illinois, QND launched distance learning on March 30, 2020, and did not return for in-person instruction for the 2019-20 school year. With 1:1 learning already in place via iPads, students and teachers effectively transitioned from traditional learning. Students were held accountable with



daily attendance. Curriculum moved forward during this time with QND teachers working tirelessly and offering thousands of hours of help time for students.

Quincy Notre Dame was not able to hold the traditional in-person graduation ceremony in the school gymnasium due to the state's health and safety guidelines and restrictions. QND celebrated the Class of 2020 with a virtual Honors Convocation, Baccalaureate Mass and Graduation Ceremony. Graduates also had the opportunity to individually receive their diploma and walk across the stage at school in their cap and gown with their families.

The 2020-2021 school year kicked off on August 17, 2020, with the school in an A-B schedule Monday through Friday. Students attend in-person instruction one day and then live stream remotely the following day. This decision was made in the best interest of students,



families and staff in order to minimize the virus transmission. The opportunity to learn from home allows students to follow the same schedule they would if they were present at school.

"Throughout my time at QND, I have had a number of reasons to be proud," states QND Principal Mark McDowell '95. "The collaboration and cooperation I have witnessed between our students, teachers, and families during the first semester of the 20202021 school year have been remarkable. We are delivering on our pledge to educate every student, every day."

What influenced you to become a teacher?

PAT: Since I have six younger siblings, it seemed that I was always teaching them something. I gave piano and swimming lessons in high school, so teaching seemed quite natural to me. The English teacher I had in high school was the reason I majored in English.

BETH: My parents. I always knew I would be a teacher, but they gave me a realistic view of the struggles and successes associated with the career. I have had different teachers that have made a big impact on what kind of teacher I wanted to be - Mrs. White here at QND was one of them - but my parents were by far the biggest influence on both the person I want to be and the teacher I want to become.

Mother Daughter Dynamic Duos

Mrs. Pat Lask has been in education for 45 years with 41 of those at QND. Ms. Beth Lask '98 is in her first year at QND and brought with her 16 years of teaching experience.

What is the best part of teaching?

PAT: Students trying and then succeeding in their learning attempts.

BETH: The answer to this question has changed throughout my career. Right now, the best part of teaching is seeing the creativity and problem-solving skills my students have brought to the situation we find ourselves in, currently. It is not just me, as the instructor, figuring everything out. It is us, as a class, moving forward in engaging and learning.

What do you like best about teaching at the same school?

PAT: It is nice to see my daughter every day.

BETH: I have lived 30 hours from home for 15 years, so to get the chance hug my mom every day has been amazing!

What is special about working at your alma mater?

BETH: There are so many memories here and every day I reflect on who I have grown into since my days spent here as a student. Many pieces to QND are the same, but I feel like my experiences have molded me into a much different person than I expected to be.

What have you learned from your daughter in regards to teaching?

PAT: Teaching is not easy at any level. My daughter teaches mathematics and I am amazed by the different techniques she employs to get students to learn. QND is especially blessed to have her because she is a caring individual with a depth of spirituality that is rarely matched.

What advice did your mom give you about teaching?

BETH: My mom lives her advice. She is so dedicated to this school and her students.

From attending weekly masses, to putting in the time outside of school to sculpt the best lessons, to overcoming frustrations with new technology, to approaching stressful situations with a calm and peaceful demeanor, she lives what I want to be as a teacher.

Do you have different styles on engaging your students?

PAT: Yes. Part of our styles is dependent upon our personalities and part is dependent upon the age of our students.

BETH: We definitely have different styles of engaging students - and very different students. She prepares seniors for life after high school. I introduce sophomores to a new area of math. We each bring our strengths and dedication to our crafts, but it has to manifest in different ways to engage our students. Mrs. Leslie Loyd began teaching in 2009 and is in her fourth year at QND. Her daughter Mrs. Rachel (Loyd) Roundtree '14 has spent all of her three teaching years at QND.

What influenced you to become a teacher?

LESLIE: I had always planned to be a lawyer, but found that I gravitated toward English classes in college. When I finished all my general education classes, I did what I wanted to do most: get married and start my family. When my daughter's Christian school needed teachers, I followed the Lord's leading and went back to school to earn my degree in elementary education. I can't imagine doing anything else.

RACHEL: My mother did, mainly, but I also enjoyed the routine of school so it wasn't really a difficult decision when it came down to it. I liked teaching, I liked art and I liked the way my mom led her life. It just felt like what I was meant to do with my life. I didn't want to fight the current once it had me.

What do you like best about teaching at the same school?

LESLIE: It's wonderful to know Rachel as my daughter and

as a colleague. It's an added dimension to our relationship that I cherish.

RACHEL: It's comforting to know that someone in the building knows me for me. It can be easy to lose yourself in your job, especially with a year as challenging as this one, so it's nice to have a steadfast anchor like my mother amidst all the chaos.

What is special about working at your alma mater?

RACHEL: It's comforting to know the expectations of the school, both as a former student and a teacher. Having that knowledge of the baseline standard (behavioral and academic) for this school is a relief. My knowledge of the workload from other classes gives me better insight into what the students can handle before they get overwhelmed by schoolwork. I try to balance my assignments with their classes as best I can.

What have you learned from your daughter in regards to teaching?

LESLIE: I have learned to value all types of literacy, especially video games and memes. I developed my Gaming as Literature course for Culver-Stockton College because of my experiences with gaming with Rachel, and that class always had a waiting list and produced some of the most profound literature analyses I have ever seen.

What advice did your mom give you about teaching?

RACHEL: My mom told me to always maintain high expectations for my students. If the students respect you and like what they're learning, they'll always rise to meet those expectations one way or another.

Do you have different styles on engaging your students?

LESLIE: On the surface, perhaps, but fundamentally, no. I've always taught students,



not subjects. I'm proud to say that my daughter does the same.

RACHEL: Since our content areas are so different, I quess so. But we're also more similar than I think most would assume. My classroom is more focused on the facilitation of student learning and handson projects—I give them the building blocks for each unit, watch the students put them together using what they already know, and offer guidance along the way. My mom does essentially the same thing with her content area, only with considerably less paint in her hair and clay smeared on her pants.

QND helped instill in me the importance of faith, community, and service in every day life. Today I strive to continuously grow in my relationship with Christ, help develop and give back to the Quincy community, and always serve those around me." – Emily Kite '16

Jordan Stegeman's passion for teaching and adventure has landed her across the globe. Jordan is currently in her fourth year of teaching special education in Kuala Lumpur, Malaysia, where she assists students with learning, behavioral and physical disabilities. Prior to her current position, Jordan spent three years

teaching at a British international school in Beijing, China. A 2007 graduate, Jordan went on to receive a degree in special education from Southern Illinois University Edwardsville in 2011.

Jordan's school follows a British curriculum for expat students and follows an inclusion model that allows her to co-teach with the general education teachers and work with students individually for more intensive interventions. Like many educational institutions across the map right now, Jordan is currently teaching live online using the Zoom platform while in the second phase of lockdown in Malaysia. Throughout the struggles that remote learning can bring, Jordan remains thankful that her path has led her abroad.

"Teaching in an international school has opened my eyes to other cultures as I've made friends, some I consider to be family, from all around the world," states Jordan. "I feel extremely lucky to have met the people I have and for the opportunities to travel around Asia learning about different cultures and history, seeing beautiful landscapes and tasting exciting new foods and flavors."

A state-wide decision was made by the Illinois High School Association (IHSA) in conjunction with the Illinois Department of Public Health (IDPH). The QND 2020 fall sport season also took on a different look as the 2020-2021 school year began as IHSA guidelines forced QND to postpone its football, volleyball and boys soccer seasons until 2021.

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
